

BOOK FIESTA! CELEBRATE CHILDREN'S DAY/BOOK DAY; CELEBREMOS EL DÍA DE LOS NIÑOS/EL DÍA DE LOS LIBROS

Book Fiesta! is a bilingual (English/Spanish) book that introduces readers to a very special day known as Día, short for El día de los niños/El día de los libros (Children's Day/Book Day). Día is dedicated to celebrating the joy of books and reading in all languages. Diverse children and families fill the pages of this book, reading with their favorite friends and in their favorite places—even in a hot air balloon!

Expert Insights into This Book

This book is especially great for engaging families of English language learners. One of the main messages of *Book Fiesta!* is that reading for fun is important for all children, no matter what their home languages are or how fluent they are in English. In addition, it speaks to the experience of a significant number of families who come from Mexico, many of whom have fond childhood memories of *El día de los niños* celebrations.

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Use the questions and ideas below to get kids thinking and talking about the story.

- 1. Do you have a favorite book that you like to look at or read?
- 2. Where is your favorite place to read? Do you have other people with whom you enjoy reading?
- 3. What other things could you read in addition to books?
- 4. How can you share books and stories with someone who doesn't yet know how to read?
- 5. The Mexican holiday of Children's Day inspired this book. How would you like to celebrate Children's Day?

THINGS to DO

Have a Book Fiesta:

Some ideas for engaging students at your book fiesta include letting them select the books you read, dressing up as a character from a book you are reading, selecting folktales from different parts of the world and acting them out, inviting "celebrity" guest readers from the community to your class, or visiting the local public library for a special story time program. If you serve in a library or community program, ask parents to help you organize your book fiesta and watch them engage in ways you might not have expected.

Host a Family Reading Event:

Invite families to visit your program to celebrate reading. Read *Book Fiesta!* aloud to the group or have several copies available for children and their families to read together. Look up how to say "book" in many different languages and encourage families to share the word in the home language they speak. Top off the event by having children and their families make their own books using art supplies, card stock, a hole punch and string.

DID you KNOW?

El día de los niños, or Children's Day, is a holiday celebrated throughout Mexico on April 30. In 1996, Pat Mora (author of Book Fiesta!) and several partners decided to create a new holiday in the United States, aligning El día de los niños with a celebration of books and literacy for all, in all languages. Día now stands for Diversity In Action, and Día celebrations can be found in schools, libraries, museums, and other organizations across the country in late April. Dear Family,

We recently read *Book Fiesta!* by Pat Mora together. This title celebrates books and the joy of reading every day, especially on a special day known as Children's Day/Book Day, or Día. It encourages us to have our own book fiesta (party or celebration) wherever we are, with whoever is there, and in whatever language or languages we read best.

You can help further your child's learning at home by asking your child to tell you what he or she remembers about the book. Also try the following activities:

Making time to read together with your child every day will help him or her become a strong reader. Read in the language that you know best, and be sure that your child sees you reading for fun from time to time. If you don't think you're a great reader, that's okay! You can tell your child stories that you remember from your childhood, or look through a picture book and make up your own story. You can also help your child learn new words by talking and singing together. Remember to provide a quiet area for your child to read and do homework, and don't forget that you are your child's first and most important teacher!

Thank you for supporting your child's reading journey! To continue learning together, visit your local library to borrow books and explore programs and events. Many libraries, schools, museums, community organizations, and parks also host special activities to celebrate Día in late April.

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


VEA lo que hemos estado LEYENDO!

Recuerde proveerle a su hijo/a un área tranquila en donde pueda él o ella leer y hacer sus tareas. ¡No olvide que usted es la maestra/el maestro más importante de la vida de su hijo/a!
